Title: The Silk Route: A Historic Journey and Its Revival



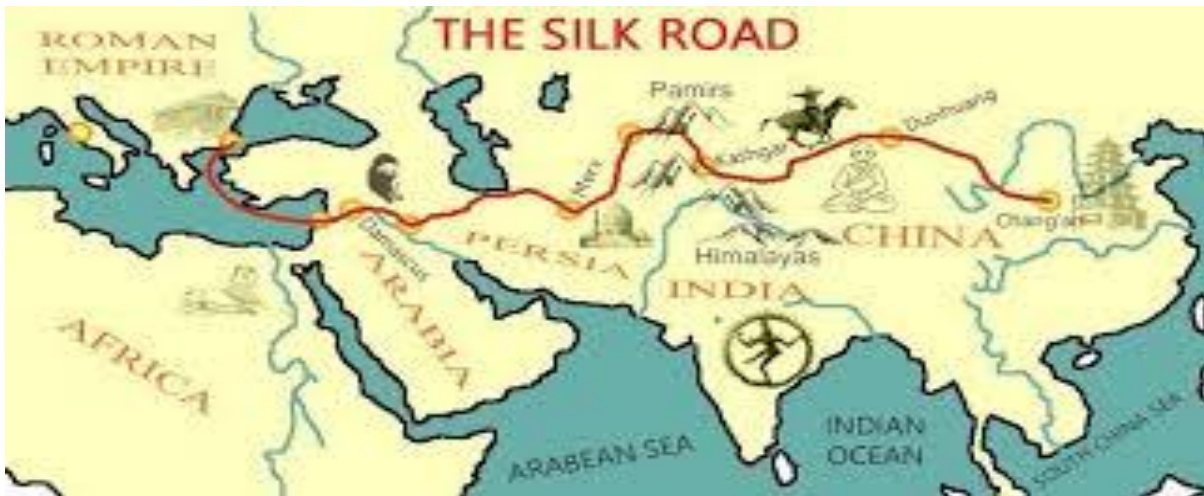
Introduction:

drinking water and trade opportunities. Archaeologists and geographers pursuing research of ancient sites have been the Silk Route's most modern travelers.

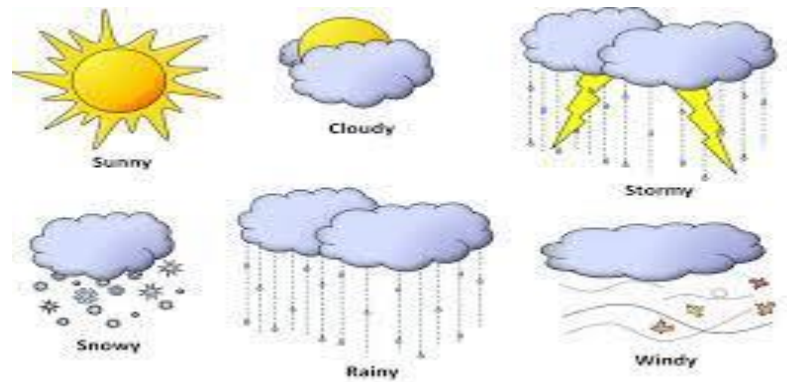
