



3. The Serene Northern Vallevs:



Ali. He suggested the name and that the letters each stood for a different region:

P - Punjab

A - Afghania

K - Kashmir

S - Sindh TAN -

Balochistan

The name also means "Land of the Pure" in the Persian and Urdu languages.
